Happy February!

WPM's Public Advisory Council (PAC) rides to the rescue! After the *Joint Appropriations Committee* voted to cut the University of Wyoming's block grant — funding that supports *WPM* along with other university entities — we turned to our *PAC* for help. A reduction of \$1.69 million over two years is a serious blow. You should have received a letter from the *PAC* outlining the situation. As a non-profit, *WPM* has limited lobbying ability, so the *PAC* steps in to carry our message. We're 60 years old! In 2026, *WPM* celebrates six decades of serving Wyoming as licensed broadcasters. Wyoming's Legislature started the year with a bang, and we're ready to help you follow every development. Check out our *WPM/WyoFile* weekly [Cheyenne Roundup](#). Our *Wyoming State Government Journalism Collaboration* team is already reporting, funded by the *Corporation for Public Broadcasting's* remaining funds ([See state government page](#)). *WPM* and *Jackson Hole Community Radio* partner to provide in-depth coverage about legislative impact on Wyomingites.

Governor Mark Gordon's *State of the State* address will air on *Wyoming Public Radio* on February 9th. President Trump's *State of the Union* address is scheduled for February 24th. Both will also be available online at wyomingpublicmedia.org.

February is *Black History Month*, and national program producers are already sending us a rich slate of special offerings to honor Black history and tradition in America. Review is in progress, and we'll share the finalists with you soon on our website wyomingpublicmedia.org.

The Grand Teton Music Festival Orchestra returns with concerts recorded live from Walk Festival Hall in Teton Village. You can hear them on both *Wyoming Public Radio* and the *Classical Wyoming* channels. Led by Maestro Donald Runnicles, the *GTMF* is a Wyoming tradition that has earned global recognition as one of the nation's premier summer festivals. Tune in Wednesday nights at 8:00 beginning February 11th. ([Link to GTMF](#)). From the opposite corner of the state, the *Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra's* season is already underway.

First it was cars, and now it's sports! *WPM* is excited to announce a new weekend program hosted by a familiar voice — David Greene, former host of *All Things Considered*. *Sports in America* will debut on Saturday, February 7th at 9 a.m., taking over the longtime spot held by the iconic *Car Talk*. *Sports in America* dives into the stories that shape athletes and fans alike. Each week, David Greene leads in-depth conversations with people from across the world of sports — from the star who hits the game-winner to the millions whose lives are touched by the games.

Why do we engage in public service? It's baked into our DNA as a *Non-Profit Educational (NCE)* license. *WPM* "educates" communities about themselves, connects people to services and growth opportunities. We use our airwaves and digital media to help Wyoming thrive, lift spirits, and provide vital information. No politics involved! This month we're excited to welcome *WyoPoets* to our *Community Minute* program and the growing roster of non-profits.

Speaking of public service, don't forget the *Community Calendar*. It's a space where you can self-enter details about events your organization is planning — quickly, easily, and on your own schedule. People really do use it! In the past month alone, we've had over 30 event entries from organizations across the state. ([Post and read of events here](#))

To be honest, we're scared. For the first time in 60 years, we face the real possibility of losing our university funding — and with it, eight key positions that maintain our statewide broadcast sites, produce three music channels, deliver state and local journalism, monitor our *FCC* compliance obligations, support the Emergency Alert System, and connect Wyoming's communities with public service. This cut crushes the backbone of our operation. The combined weekly broadcast time of our 4 channels is ~672 hours, of which 86 hours originate from *NPR*. That's just 13% of the schedule. The rest is cultural programming, local news and information, and classical and jazz music from national syndicators. Yet, that 13% is the irritant that drives legislative ire and throws a statewide network at risk. ([TRANSCRIPT LINK](#)) Legislators need to hear from their constituents.

To enhance understanding, the *JAC* vote transcript and the statements issued to the press by legislators would benefit from additional clarification and context. Briefly:

- *WPM can sell more advertising to make money.* Wrong. *WPM* is a *Non-Commercial Educational* license. No advertising allowed. No political ads.

- *WPM can fundraise annually for the \$800K JAC cut.* Highly unlikely with a population of 580,000. The scale simply may not be there.

- *Wyoming should emulate President Trump's action to defund NPR and PBS.* This goal wasn't achieved. *NPR* lost only 1% of revenue generated by federal funding and is thriving and growing. Local stations and networks like *WPM* bore the brunt of this defunding and many contracted or closed. Local populations, particularly in rural states, were the losers.

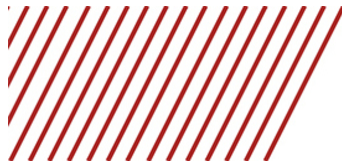
- *WPM broadcasts propaganda in the style of PRAVDA and should not be funded by the state.* Two things here: 1) *WPM* does not produce *NPR* programs and has no control over their editorial process, 2) this thinking falls under individual opinion making and should be respected as such. However, denying funding based on a subjective opinion borders on infringement of First Amendment rights.

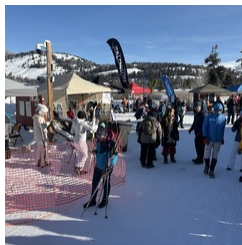

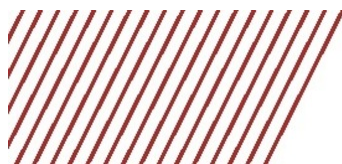
