very day, across our radio, television, and digital platforms, WLRN brings the region's rich diversity, complex challenges, and unique culture to life. Through trusted journalism, original documentaries, and thoughtful programming, we strive to connect communities and reflect the voices of the people who call South Florida home.

That work is especially vital in today's media landscape, where local newsrooms are shrinking, misinformation is rampant, and communities often lack access to reliable, independent reporting. Public media remains one of the last bastions of fact-based journalism—free from commercial pressures and driven by public service. And it's not just on the radio dial-public television plays a critical role as well, offering lifelong learning, cultural programming, and trusted children's content that commercial outlets often overlook. Programming that explores the natural world, examines history, and showcases the arts helps to inform, uplift, and connect viewers of all ages. In a fragmented media environment, WLRN remains a place for shared experiences and thoughtful storytelling that brings people together.

But that mission is increasingly under threat. Persistent challenges to public media funding over the last year have put stations like WLRN at risk, especially in areas where they serve as one of the few remaining trusted news and educational sources. The stakes are high: without public media, entire communities could lose access to critical information, cultural connection, and educational resources.

Public media's impact is clear—and WLRN's work over the past year proves it. The investigative series *Unguarded* earned national recognition from the Esserman–Knight Journalism Awards and Investigative Reporters & Editors. WLRN News brought home five regional Edward R. Murrow Awards and nine honors from the Florida Association of Broadcast Journalists, including Station of the Year. WLRN-TV was also recognized by the Suncoast Regional Emmy Awards for its original

productions Never Drop the Ball and South Florida Seafood Sustainability: Two Docks. These honors reflect more than excellence—they affirm the essential role of community-rooted public media.

To build on that momentum, WLRN is embracing digital innovation to meet the challenges of the future and better serve a growing, increasingly connected audience. At the heart of this evolution remains our commitment to storytelling—delivered in new and dynamic ways. From expanding our on-demand audio and video offerings to award-winning podcasts, WLRN is finding fresh ways to tell the stories that matter. And with a new immersive app set to debut in the near future, WLRN is ensuring that powerful, meaningful storytelling remains at the center of the public media experience—now and for the next generation.

In a time when trusted, fact-based storytelling is both more essential—and more at risk—than ever before, WLRN remains a steadfast source of truth and connection. WLRN Public Radio

As South Florida's only source for NPR News, 91.3 WLRN and 91.5 WKWM in the Florida Keys—along with 101.9 FM and 105.5 WOLL HD-2 in Palm Beach—deliver award-winning journalism, insightful reporting, thoughtful conversation, and engaging entertainment to a wide swath of Southeast Florida.

In addition, WLRN's Classical HD-2 service offers listeners a curated selection of classical music, expertly hosted and available around the clock on HD-capable radios and digital devices.

WLRN FM maintained a strong and consistent audience this year, along with solid market share. Morning Drive (6 a.m. – 6 p.m.) continues to perform exceptionally well, drawing an impressive average of 5.5% of the highly competitive market during that time slot. WLRN now ranks 9th overall in the market and 5th during morning drive.

WLRN FM LOCAL PROGRAMMING

WLRN continues to serve South Florida's diverse community with an exceptional lineup of local radio programming. From in-depth news coverage to arts and culture stories that reflect the region's unique identity, WLRN's locally produced shows have earned widespread recognition for their quality and impact. Every week, listeners rely on WLRN for meaningful, relevant content that speaks directly to the heart of South Florida.



Host Tom Hudson is joined by journalists and newsmakers from across the state for a thoughtful look at the stories shaping Florida. This live, hour-long call-in program airs Fridays at 12 p.m., with a rebroadcast Saturdays at 7 a.m., and is carried statewide by all major Florida public radio stations.



A panel of journalists and newsmakers from around the state join listeners for a lively discussion of the week's top stories—through the lens of South Florida. The hour-long program is hosted this year by WLRN's Americas Editor Tim Padgett, with occasional hosting by other WLRN anchors and reporters. It airs live on Fridays and is rebroadcast Saturday mornings at 6 a.m.



Monday through Thursday from 1 to 2 p.m., WLRN News reporters contribute local stories and context to the nationally distributed NPR program Here & Now.



Each Sunday from 3 to 5 p.m., Michael Stock brings listeners an intimate and insightful blend of folk and acoustic music. A mainstay on South Florida's airwaves since 1981, Michael shares rich musical history, the latest recordings, live in-studio performances, artist interviews, and a comprehensive calendar of folk-related events—all with warmth, depth, and a true passion for the genre.

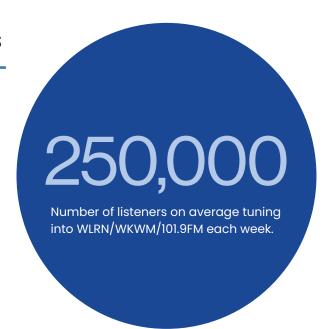

WLRN News Awards



WLRN News earned two 2024 Regional Edward R. Murrow Awards for outstanding reporting.

Environment Editor **Jenny Staletovich** won in the Excellence in Writing category for her exclusive report on a mass die-off of sawfish in the Florida Keys. Investigative Reporter **Daniel Rivero** received the award for Investigative Reporting for uncovering the widespread impact of Florida's 2023 anti-union law, which led to the loss of tens of thousands of public sector union memberships statewide.



WLRN was named **Radio Station Of The Year** by the FABJ for its news and current affairs coverage in 2024. The news team won an additional seven awards as well as seven finalist honors.



Reporters **Danny Rivero** and **Josh Ceballos** received an honorable mention for exposing Miami City Manager Art Noriega's undisclosed awarding of over \$440,000 in city contracts to his wife's furniture company.



WLRN received 4 first place wins and four 2nd place wins from the prestigious association.

Haiti on the Line

Over 5,000 people were killed in gang-related violence in Haiti last year, amid a prolonged political crisis. For Haitians in America, navigating both unstable realities is increasingly difficult. To explore this, public radio stations from cities with large Haitian populations—New York, Boston, and Miami—teamed up for a live special. On February 24, 2025, Brian Lehrer, Saraya Wintersmith, and Tim Padgett hosted *Haiti on the Line*, a 90-minute program featuring personal stories from Haitian communities, examining their ties to Haiti, the crisis, and the challenges faced by migrants in the U.S.

History We Call Home

A century ago, South Florida's land boom transformed swampland, farms, and small settlements into thriving cities, fueled by post-war growth, entrepreneurial spirit, and Florida glamour. By the mid-20th century, the region's population surged into the hundreds of thousands. In 2025 and 2026, 11 cities from Palm Beach County to Miami-Dade will celebrate their centennials. To mark this milestone, WLRN News will present History We Call Home: 100 Years of South Florida, a year-long series that explores the area's past to better understand its present and future.



Hurricane Ready

WLRN is part of the Florida Public Radio Emergency Network (FPREN), activated during weather emergencies to provide timely, accurate information. WLRN's climate reporting highlighted discussions about shifting the season's start to mid-May. We continue to broadcast and share essential safety information, with forecasts and interactive maps available on our weather page, powered by Florida Storms.

2024 Elections

WLRN delivered standout, multiplatform election coverage in 2024—on-air and online—across presidential, state, and local levels:

Presidential Election

Election-night live updates:

WLRN's digital live-blog followed South Florida voting tracking turnout, voter lines, and key developments—and offered in-depth real-time analysis tailored to local conditions at wlrn.org

NPR partnership: On the radio, WLRN broadcast NPR's national election-night programming, featuring live results, electoral vote counts, and context on pivotal swing states—all grounded in WLRN's regional perspective.

Statewide Races

"Know Your Federal, State Candidates" digital guide:

WLRN compiled profiles for every major state and federal candidate—covering their platforms, campaign finance, and stance on ballot amendments—serving as a comprehensive voter prep tool.

Fact-checking via PolitiFact:

Through its collaboration with PolitiFact, WLRN integrated rigorously vetted content on political statements directly into its coverage, reinforcing clarity and accuracy for Florida voters.

Local & Regional Coverage

Live blog insights: WLRN's blogged highlighted county-level races—MiamiDade's tax collector and property appraiser, Palm Beach's mayoral and commission races—providing real-time results and explanations.

Voter guides & early voting updates: Featured interactive tools to locate polling sites, early voting schedules county by county, and candidate forums for local posts

In-depth roundtables:

Programs like "The Florida Roundup and South Florida Roundup" before and after the elections to explain the implications of a historic presidential race and crucial local and state contests.

In 2024, WLRN-TV also began streaming its broadcast signal on Amazon Prime. Additionally, WLRN-TV can be seen on YouTube TV, DirecTV Stream, and Hulu+, providing even more ways to enjoy our content.

WLRN's on-demand library of PBS favorites and WLRN original productions, **WLRN Passport**, is available to WLRN-TV members and streamed through the PBS and WLRN App and at wlrn.org.



SOUTH FLORIDA'S STORYTELLER

WLRN-TV has long been at the forefront of telling the stories that make our community truly one-of-a-kind. From local legends to cultural treasures, we shine a light on the people, places, and events that define South Florida. With over 47 of our award-winning productions shared with PBS affiliates nationwide, WLRN's acclaimed documentaries and short stories are also available online to Miami-Dade County Public School teachers and students at video. wlrn.org.



In 2025, WLRN-TV premiered The Creole Pig: Haiti's Great Loss, an original production exploring the impact of a 1980s swine flu outbreak that led to the mass extermination of Haiti's Creole pigs, a vital resource for the country. This decision, made by USAID and the Haitian government, caused a devastating economic blow to an already struggling nation. The film was released nationwide in February 2025 through American Public Television, airing on 95 stations. WLRN-TV also created an educational study guide for grades 9-12, aligned with Florida's Sunshine State Standards, available for download at thecreolepig.org.

In addition to WLRN-TV's original productions, WLRN-TV also produces the following programming:

The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Parade

An annual event in Liberty City, WLRN-TV recorded the three-hour event held on January 20th, 2025. Viewers were able to see a condensed one-hour version days later on WLRN-TV.

The 67th Annual Silver Knight Awards Ceremony

Presented by The Herald/El Nuevo Herald, WLRN broadcast a one-hour awards highlight on Tuesday, June 10th, to honor Miami-Dade and Broward County public school seniors for their academic excellence and passion for community service.

The Florida Roundup LIVE at Zoo Miami

Host Tom Hudson led a dynamic conversation exploring the intersection of politics and animal conservation, featuring Miami-Dade Mayor Daniella Levine Cava and Dr. Frank Ridgley, Zoo Miami's Head of Research and Conservation. The event also included live music by Bob Bonnen & The Side Effects, adding to the lively atmosphere.

The Creole Pig: Haiti's Great Loss Premiere Screenings

WLRN hosted a series of free community screenings for our new original production, *The Creole Pig: Haiti's Great Loss.*This powerful documentary explores the story of the Creole pig—a vital part of Haitian life for generations—and the lasting impact of its eradication on the country's rural communities. Each screening was followed by a moderated Q & A session with the films creators and community leaders.

The event featured spotlight poets who performed their *Zip Odes* and shared the personal stories and inspiration behind their work. This was followed by a month-long pop-up gallery set in the heart of the Everglades, showcasing powerful imagery captured during the podcast's production by Pulitzer Prizewinning photographer Patrick Farrell.

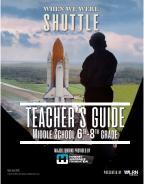
WLRN HIGH SCHOOL INTERNSHIP PROGRAM
