Dear Public Radio 90 Members,

We may be down, but don't count us out! I want you all to know that we are working hard every day to find our way through this loss of federal funding—we are 100% committed to ensuring that Public Radio 90 continues to serve. I'm not going to pretend that it will be easy, but with your help, we will keep Public Radio 90 on-the-air for all to enjoy.

We continue to work with our national partners (NPR, PBS, etc.) who are working to try to find some large foundational support for rural stations like us. NPR is also offering us some program relief/savings on our NPR program line-up. We are also reaching out to all of our program suppliers and producers to ask for program cost relief and I am happy to say that many of them are working with us, which will help us keep most of our programming in place. We do have some hard decisions to make about our most costly programs like *Wait Wait...Don't Tell Me* (cost: \$14,099) – it won't be easy to say goodbye to a beloved show, but it's hard to justify that cost going forward. We won't know the full status of our financial needs until we have our annual audit completed. That detail will guide and, in some cases, dictate some of the cost-savings measures needed.

As you can see, we continue to navigate through this, so that we can find our new budget reality, which will guide our fundraising efforts going forward. This is where you come in! We still need all of our supporters to encourage new sustaining members to the station. As I said before: The partnership that public media has with its members is both unique and strong, but it requires financial support from us all. As a member of Public Radio 90 you are part of a special group of people who place a high value on the unique and special programming that is curated just for our listening area. Talk to your circle of friends and family and encourage them to support the station through a sustaining membership.

I also want to take a moment to thank all of our amazing long-term donors – you are all incredible and we thank you so very much for your continued financial support. To all of our new members - welcome and thank you for your support! And, to the many of you who reached out to our staff to offer words of encouragement and support – we are immensely grateful - you keep us focused and motivated!

We can do this together: for you, for our neighbors, for our communities. Public Radio matters!
