Award-winning percussionist, bandleader and WBGO's host of "Latin Jazz Cruise" Bobby Sanabria will leading an all-star band there.

Vanguard Theater, with a local connection to the initiative's four key focus areas of economic justice, education, narrative change, and social justice was the only recipient in New Jersey - and one of only two theater companies.

Casino effort near Citi Field hits roadblock

Assemblyman Jeffery Aubry of Queens has introduced a bill allowing for a casino in the overflow parking lots by Citi Field.

"In a time when the city and the state need economic growth, you have a project that will engage in creating that kind of economics."

But he doesn't have a companion bill in the senate. Senator Jessica Ramos who represents the area now says she won't introduce legislation allowing for the casino. She says a lot of people oppose the project. The Mets owner through a reps says he will continue to work with the senator to figure out what to do with the 50 acres around Citi Field.

NYC office values projected to drop a lot over coming years

The values of New York City offices are expected to drop a lot in the coming years due to remote work.

A revised survey by researchers at NYU and Columbia predicts New York City's offices as a whole will lose 44-percent of their pre-COVID pandemic value by year 2029. That's higher than the 28-percent they were projected to lose in the original survey published last year. Professor Vrinda Mittal at Columbia is one of authors of the study.

Deal reached on outdoor dining in NYC

The New York City Council and Mayor Eric Adams have reached a deal on a long stalled bill to address outdoor dining.

Director of the New York City Hospitality Alliance Andrew Rigie says the deal cuts red tape and lowers fees for restaurants to participate.

Anti-smoking groups still seek FDA ruling banning menthol cigarettes

A federal law passed in 2009 banned flavored cigarettes —- except menthol

Anti-smoking groups want to see the FDA issue a final rule banning menthol cigarettes later this year. It issued draft regulations a year ago. Advocates say the tobacco industry has used menthol for decades as an appeal to minorities and teens.

Dr. Phillip Gardiner of the African American Tobacco Control Leadership Council said he is skeptical.

Dr. Kathy Hempstead of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation said surveys have shown most people don't know this is happening, and certain groups will be at most risk of losing benefits.

Newark public schools may upgrade security system with artificial intelligence

Artificial intelligence may be on its way to Newark's public schools, as the district seeks to replace its security cameras with a surveillance system that would be equipped with A-I.

The new system would have more than 7000 cameras, one for every five students, and be able to recognize not just people but cars, guns, and even sensors to detect chemicals in vape pens.

Community advocates and security experts say such a system could violate the privacy of students and staff. And Chalkbeat Newark's Jessie Gomez said so far the state has been pretty hands off on A-I.
