Guidelines & Requirements

- 1. The presentation must contain a minimum of six (6) slides.
- 2. At least one slide must provide *general information* about "your favorite meal"
- 3. At least one slide must identify in list format the steps to prepare "your favorite meal"
- 4. At least one slide must identify in list format the ingredients for "your favorite meal"
- 5. At least one slide must include <u>a map or drawing</u> of the part of the world where "your favorite meal" is best known or originates from
- 6. At least one slide must <u>include a *graph, chart or table*</u> with numerical information about the ingredient's nutritional values.
- 7. At least one slide with the cookbook brand that <u>you will create</u> and include a name for your cookbook brand, logo and contact information for recipe submissions.
- 8. Use the 5/5/5 rule: no more than 5 words per line of text, five lines of text per slide, or five text-heavy slides in a row.

Tips for a Great Presentation

Hey there! When you're making your slides, don't hold back! Use all the cool features the program has to offer. Add clip art, draw stuff, and even throw in some audio or video clips if you want. But here's the deal: it's not just about fancy effects or transitions between slides. What really matters is how your slides look and how they flow together.

Your main goal is to make a presentation that looks awesome and tells people what they need to know about cooking "your favorite meal." So, think about how you arrange your text, what size you make your fonts, and which colors you use. And don't forget about pictures, charts, and lists – they're super helpful for getting your points across.

Remember – accessibility is key! Make sure to add alt text to all your graphics and images. And when you're done, check the reading order of your slides to make sure they make sense for people using screen readers or other assistive technology. Just go to Review and hit Check Accessibility to make sure everything's good to go.

One last note: before you dive into creating your slides on the computer, here's a tip: take some time to brainstorm and plan things out on paper. Spend at least 10 minutes doodling, jotting down ideas, and discussing your project with your team. This can help you clarify your thoughts and come up with a solid plan before you start messing around with the software. Trust me, a little planning can go a long way in making your presentation awesome!
