Section II. Responsive Programs

The station has broadcast programming that deal with the issues listed above. Programming that discusses those various issues are listed below.

A: COVID-19 -- KENW-TV, FCC Issues, Q2 – 2022

5/05/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

The patient-doctor relationship is complicated and fraught. Patients often feel confused and talked down to, in part because doctors feel like they need to project authority. As a physician and a poet, Laura Kolbe is trying to make room for uncertainty and humility from both sides in the exam room. Kolbe's new collection of poetry, Little Pharma, explores the messy and human side of doctoring. The Covid-19 pandemic has exposed so many vulnerabilities in our healthcare system, from racial inequities to provider burnout. Irène Mathieu is a writer, pediatrician, and medical teacher. She argues that poetry can be a small part of fixing those vulnerabilities. What if the difference between the right diagnosis and the wrong diagnosis is whether or not a doctor thinks you're believable? Cathryn Molloy shares because education, socio-economic status, and especially gender influence how doctors listen to and treat their patients.

B: Education -- KENW-TV, FCC Issues, Q2 -- 2022

4/5/2022 – The Best of Our Knowledge, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

Springtime means the weather gets warmer, the birds start singing a bit louder, and high school seniors around the U.S. are getting their college acceptance, or non-acceptance letters. Each year around this time, The Princeton Review releases its survey of incoming college students. Today on the Best of Our Knowledge, we'll hear about the hopes and fears of new college students and their families.

6/30/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

New-to-this-country students are constantly being asked to adapt. And often, their wellbeing is measured almost entirely by their ability to speak English. Alfonzo Perez Acosta (Virginia Humanities K-12 Education Fellow) is an arts educator. In his classroom, he gives students the tools to let their art do the talking. Plus: Everybody has a story. Not everyone has a place to tell it. Through the Community Media Center, Chioke l'Anson (VCU ICA Community Media Center0 hopes to solve the problem of the untold story. Later in the show: Education has long been seen as a tool of racial uplift. In the early twentieth century, Phyllis Wheatley YWCAs across the country served young Black girls and women. Cassandra Newby-Alexander (Norfolk State University) fondly recalls her days at the Norfolk YWCA and is hopeful about what the old facility could become today. Plus: A generous grant from the Mellon Foundation has changed the game for many Richmond area high schoolers. Janelle Marshall (Pathways to the Arts and Humanities) and her team are helping get students enrolled and sticking beside them all the way until the finish line.

C: Health Matters -- KENW-TV, FCC Issues, Q2 – 2022

4/12/2022 – The Best of Our Knowledge, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

Pregnancy means big changes for a woman and her health. Pregnancy during a pandemic threw out all the rules. Today on the Best of Our Knowledge, what science knows and is still learning about COVID and maternity. We'll also take another look at caring for trans students health and spend an Academic Minute with your brain on Zoom.

5/19/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

Whether you're on foot crossing the street, or behind the wheel — there are a lot of new technologies to be distracted by. Bryan Porter says that we do not recover from looking at our phones as quickly as

we think. Is your brain on the road when you are?

6/14/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

In March, the Senate approved the Sunshine Protection Act – which, if passed, will make daylight savings time permanent. The bill has been praised by many, but Mariana Szklo-Coxe says not so fast. She studies how permanent daylight savings time will affect our sleep. Also, Postpartum depression is one of the leading complications of childbirth, but most mothers are never screened for it. Jennifer Payne conducted a worldwide study and found that first time moms, young moms, and moms with twins have the highest rates of postpartum depression. Chemotherapy is the best weapon we have at fighting cancer. But it's notoriously hard on the body and causes a number of side-effects. Maxwell Hennings studies chemo brain, a mysterious ailment linked to cognitive decline in some patients who have undergone chemotherapy. Many people are prescribed drugs like Prilosec and Prevacid to treat their heartburn symptoms. But what if those same drugs could fight cancer? Randall Reif says heartburn drugs could have the potential to revolutionize the way we treat certain cancers.

D: Governmental -- KENW-TV, FCC Issues, Q2 – 2022

6/19/2022-Enchanted Four Winds, 9:20 a.m. – 7 minutes 08 seconds.

Aired in 3 parts- In celebration of the Air Force's 75th birthday, the 49th Wing at Holloman Air Force Base hosted the 2022 Legacy of Liberty Air Show and Open House, where more than 22,000 guests visited from around the world, marking the largest gathering at Holloman in over a decade. The show included aerial performances from the U.S. Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron, known as the Thunderbirds, F-35 Lightning II demonstration team, A-10C Thunderbolt II demonstration team, and several legacy aircraft, including the World War II hero, the P-51 Mustang. Cultura producers were able to sit down with the planners of the event and with the 49th wing commander, Col Ryan Keeney to understand the history and legacy of Holloman Air Force Base, as well as the importance behind strong air power.

E: Gender / Race -- KENW-TV, FCC Issues, Q2 – 2022

4/6/2022 – 51%, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

On this week's 51%, we recognize Women's History Month. We learn about Sarah Smiley, a controversial Quaker minister who dared to preach to women — and men — in the 19th Century, and Nancy Brown of the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites provides a more local lens on the women's suffrage movement. We also stop by the New York State Museum to learn about a new initiative to expand its collection on women's sports.

4/6/2022 - 51%, 3 p.m. - 30 minutes.

On this week's 51%, we speak with Robie Harris, author of the groundbreaking children's book, It's Perfectly Normal, about the importance of comprehensive sex education, and how parents can navigate "the talk" with their kids.

5/11/2022 – 51%, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

On this week's 51%, we recognize Mother's Day and the International Day of the Midwife. Betsy Mercogliano, a licensed midwife with Albany's Family Life Center, discusses the ins and outs of home birth. And WAMC's Sarah LaDuke shares an interview she conducted with her late mother last year.

6/9/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

American railroads of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century were littered with racial, gendered traps. And from working in the food car to sitting in first class, Black women are critical to the history of the American railroad. Thaggert's new book is Riding Jane Crow African American Women on the American Railroad. While many European writers described the open road as a place of freedom, African Americans revealed a different reality. From periodicals to fiction and nonfiction, Michael Hall says that travel experiences in black literature are raw data about challenges to Black people's mobility in America. His new book is Freedom Beyond Confinement: Travel and Imagination in African-American Cultural History and Letters. All the historic records suggest that the South Hampton YWCA was chartered in 1911. But Michelle Ellis Young found out that that wasn't true. In fact, that YMCA was chartered in 1908 by a little-known shero named Laura E. Titus.

6/22/2022 - 51%, 3 p.m. - 30 minutes.

On this week's 51%, we speak with authors Janie Victoria Ward and Tracy Robinson-Wood about their new book, Sister Resisters: Mentoring Black Women on Campus, on how college faculty can better mentor Black students. We also take a look at a new Marist Poll analyzing how Americans perceive Title IX, ahead of the legislation's 50th anniversary.

6/29/2022 – 51%, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

On this week's 51%: we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Title IX. We look back on the history of the legislation and its impact on women's sports, and civil rights lawyer Alexandra Brodsky discusses her book Sexual Justice, about how Title IX can better address cases of sexual harassment and assault.

4/7/2022 – With Good Reason, 3 p.m. – 30 minutes.

Many of us are more closely tuned in to the environment around us than ever before. We're spending more time hanging outdoors, planting kitchen gardens, and taking up birdwatching. In honor of Earth Day and our new relationship with the great outdoors, With Good Reason invites you to walk with us. We traipse around the foothills of Appalachia with Ryan Huish. We wade through ghost forest wetlands with Matt Kirwan and we venture into dark caves with Ángel García.

Climate change, shrinking wildlife habitats, rising sea levels, and vanishing species. These are big, important ideas that deserve a proper exploration—just the type of revealing journey you will experience in "The Atlas of a Changing Climate." It's the work of Brian Buma, an assistant professor of Quantitative Biology at the University of Colorado. Dr. Buma is also an affiliate professor at the University of Alaska. His explorations and wanderings around the globe have been featured in National Geographic.
