President Trump’s administration has pushed the limits of presidential and military power in its efforts to crackdown on immigration. Valeria Garcia Tavares, an attorney with the New Mexico Immigrant Law Center, tells New Mexico In Focus what she’s hearing about the experience of those living in our state without legal status.

Many of New Mexico's state programs rely heavily on both federal funding and staffing. Recent cuts by the so-called Department of Government Efficiency are putting many of those programs in jeopardy. Bill McCamley, a Democratic former state representative and cabinet secretary, discussed how those cuts will impact New Mexicans.

Eastern New Mexico University announced that it received 22.6 million in capital outlay funding from the NM State Legislature, with the funds being split between the Portales, Roswell, and Ruidoso campuses. The ENMU Portales campus will put the funds towards a new Student Academic Services building, as well as contributions to the Science, Agriculture, and Theatre buildings.

An unvaccinated child in Chaves County was diagnosed with measles. This made Chaves County the third county in New Mexico to see a case, with 56 total cases of measles reported in New Mexico across Chaves, Lea, and Eddy county.

The Portales Fire Department added a new vehicle to its fleet: a Type 1 Ambulance with a solid front chassis and a large back space with plenty of room for patients and personnel. The ambulance was paid for using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.

Viewers with non-Real IDs were encouraged to update their documents as the Department of Homeland Security requirements were announced to go into effect following the May 7th guideline. The zookeepers are using the experimental technique after numerous other medications failed to treat the tiger's arthritis. They believe that Sooner is now more active. He is the only tiger in the United States known to be using CBD for arthritis treatment.

G: Historical –

April 19th commemorated the anniversary of the Oklahoma City bombing, during which 168 people were killed after Timothy McVeigh planted a bomb in front of the Alfred P Murrah Federal Building in a parked car. McVeigh was arrested just 90 minutes after the bombing when a State Trooper noticed that his vehicle lacked license plates.

H: Agriculture –

April 7th was the deadline for hunters with barbary sheep, ibex, javelina, oryx, or trapper tags to submit their harvest reports to the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish for 2024-2025. Viewers were reminded that failing to submit these reports would lead to rejection of all draw applications in the future.
