What a spectacular response! Close to 1,000 donors responded during spring fund drive with renewals, one-time gifts, and upgrades to their sustainer programs. At times, our phone volunteers were overwhelmed. WPM is proud to welcome 166 new members – a record for one fund drive! We heard a common thread echoed over and over again – don't mess with my public radio! The entire staff, advisory council members, and volunteers are voicing a resounding thanks to all who came through with support and well-wishing. It was truly overwhelming. We are motivated and not sitting on our laurels. There's danger ahead, and we are trekking on to ensure that we are reaching out to all Wyomingites to support and preserve Wyoming's public radio and media!

President Trump issued an Executive Order late Thursday directing the CPB to “cease federal funding for NPR and PBS on the grounds of ideological bias.” Here is the official CPB response: “CPB is not a federal executive agency subject to the President’s authority. Congress directly authorized and funded CPB to be a private nonprofit corporation wholly independent of the federal government. In creating CPB, Congress expressly forbade ‘any department, agency, officer, or employee of the United States to exercise any direction, supervision, or control over educational television or radio broadcasting, or over [CPB] or any of its grantees or contractors...’ 47 U.S.C. § 398(c).” This issue is a fast moving target with many parts. Several days prior to the EO, the administration fired 3 CPB board members. CPB sought a restraining order. U.S. District Judge Randolph Moss directed the government to file its opposition to the restraining order by May 9. 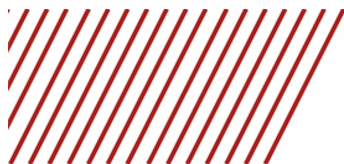

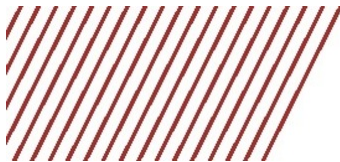

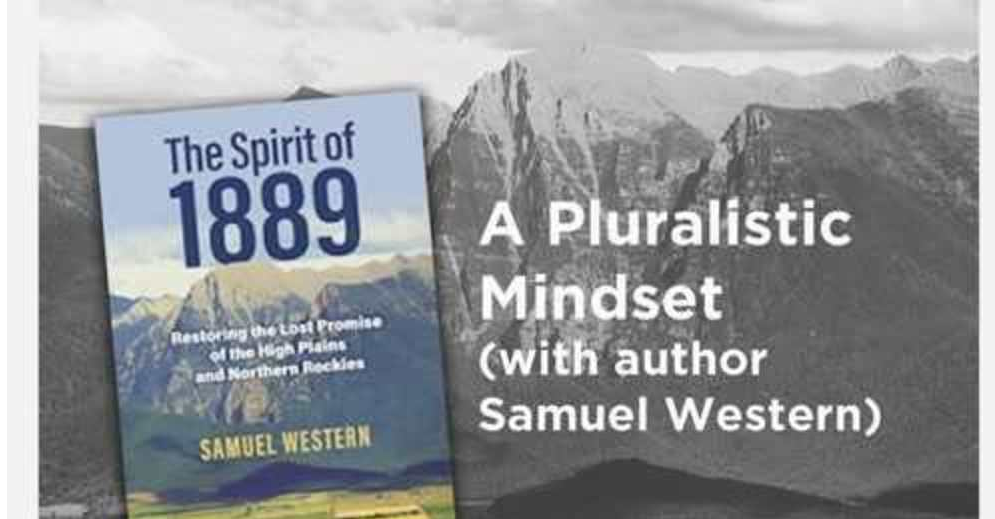
