Requirements to Participate

- Must be a Washtenaw County resident.
- Already have a Housing Choice
 Voucher or been approved to
 receive a housing choice voucher.
- Someone living in the household who is or has been justiceimpacted.



Housing Choice Vouchers and are justice-impacted to increase housing stability and self-sufficiency.




The Rising Hope program assists

Washtenaw County households
avoid eviction and improve housing
stability and self-sufficiency
through services such as traumainformed, case management, peer
support/mentorship, move-in
assistance, security deposit, rent
arrears, utility shutoffs, and much
more in conjunction with various
non-profit organizations based in
the Washtenaw County area.

Rising Hope offers a wide range of services through referrals for those who qualify.

Why the need for Rising Hope?

- Since marijuana disproportionately impacts people of color and those with lower economic status, the money made from its criminalization is used towards helping those impacted.
- The housing shortage forces
 households to use a larger share of
 their income on housing, which
 reduces the amount available for
 other necessities.
- 79% of participants in a 2015 survey said they were denied housing because they or a family member was incarcerated.
- Housing has been shown to decease recidivism.
- This collaborative initiative fills a gap in the local housing services by serving a targeted demographic that the default system does not sufficiently support.
