Federal reorganization continues in Washington. Here are the most immediate concerns related to public broadcasting:

- March 26th hearing in Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Greene's DOGE committee. NPR and PBS will answer questions of bias in news reporting.
- Responding to FCC Chair's scrutiny of underwriting messages aired by NPR, PBS, and stations. This is still ongoing.
- Changes in the makeup of the press pool traveling with the President. Control will be in the hands of the White House instead of the White House Correspondents' Association.
- The banning of AP stemming from the Gulf of Mexico vs Gulf of American dustup is making its way through the legal system.

Keith Woods, *NPR's* Chief Diversity Officer, is retiring after 46 years of award-winning journalism and leadership. Keith trained journalists in ethics, reporting and writing. He edited the Institute's anthology, *"Best Newspaper Writing,"* and is co-author of *The Authentic Voice: The Best Reporting on Race and Ethnicity*. A transformative leader, Keith has been a trusted mentor to hundreds of colleagues at *NPR* and around the public radio system. He will be missed by colleagues across public media.

How is global journalism affected by cuts to USAID? Food delivery to underserved global areas was affected by the Administration's decision to freeze U.S. foreign aid. But the freeze also affected global journalistic organizations, depending on US foreign aid, and serving in areas where news is unavailable or suppressed. Decisions have consequences. Two recent articles shed light on this situation. The new administration keeps us on our toes! Two immediate issues under scrutiny that affect all stations and networks are federal funding to public broadcasting and underwriting messages that are monitored by the FCC. "Defund NPR," is often heard from politicians, often conflated with "cut federal appropriations to CPB." A recent issue of *NPR Public Editor* tries to unravel the differences. [See link](#)

March 6th is *Protect My Public Media Day* – a national day of action to celebrate public radio and media. It's

Congratulations to *NPR's* Steve Inskeep for being recognized by the *RTNDA Foundation's First Amendment Award*. Steve was among several honorees named in this award. The *RTNDA Foundation* is the educational arm of the *Radio Television Digital News Association*, and it presents the awards to journalists, organizations and individuals for their dedication to upholding the First Amendment and their commitment to a free press. A *Citation of Courage* will honor the *Associated Press*, for its decision to serve the public resulting from the executive order to rename the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of America. 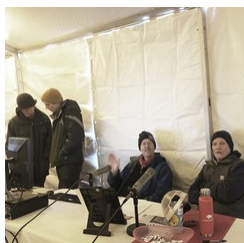


WPM's Kamila Kudelska Interviewed US Ambassador to Tunisia, Joey Hood

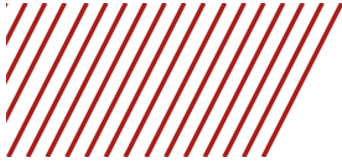

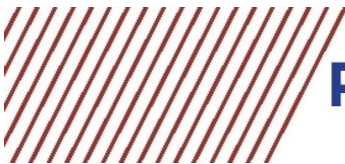
