




The Magic of Joe Hisaishi Monday, July 7 at 10 am


45th Annual **Hiawatha Traditional Music Festival**

Friday, July 18-Sunday, July 20

The Hiawatha Festival is the only event of its size and scope in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Without Hiawatha, local performers and fans would have to travel between four and six hours to the nearest comparable festivals. Each year's event features traditional-music styles that include Bluegrass, Old-Timey, Cajun, Celtic, acoustic Blues, and Folk. It also features traditional dance styles. Main stage acts include nationally known performers as well as regional and local favorites.

The Festival opens its gates at 1pm on Friday. Children ages 0-8, Tweens ages 9-12, and Teens ages 13-17 activities and performances run all day on Saturday and Sunday. Various musician-led workshops, open jams, and dance sessions run throughout the day on Saturday and Sunday. 'Artists in the Round', a juried traditional arts show, is on Saturday and Sunday, and our Young Artists Corner on Saturday afternoon.



Marine Forecasts can be heard week days (Mon-Fri) at 8:49 am, 11:59 am and 5:18 pm; and weekends (Sat-Sun) at 8:18 am, 11:59 am and 5:19 pm (all times Eastern).

Please note that forecasts may be pre-empted during times when WNMU is using computer automated programming.



"We get extreme pain, sadness and tenderness, and somehow he also finds these moments of just pure celebration." After the Verdi, the Escher String Quartet delivers one of the iconic chamber works of the 20th century: the String Quartet No. 5, which Bartók composed in 1934. The Escher String Quartet met as students at the Manhattan School of Music in 2005, and the ensemble

came into their own through the process of mastering this difficult work of great power and depth.
