In 2021 WVIA aired 316 hours of local programming content. Programming highlights include our premier public affairs series, "Keystone Edition" which focused on local and regional issues including, Older Adult Isolation, Food Insecurity and Child Abuse. The goal of this series is to connect viewers with resources and promote collaboration amongst regional non-profits. In addition, WVIA and Geisinger presented a new mental health initiative called Mind Over Matter. Like WVIA's successful Battling Opioids series, this public health initiative aims to improve the mental and physical health of our community through a multiplatform approach that will include TV, radio and digital content.

Battling Opioids: A Project of Pennsylvania PBS, Part 8

Premiere Date: 4/29/2021

Pennsylvania saw an increase in overdose deaths in 2020 — up from 4,458 in 2019 to 4,880.

WVIA was the lead producing station for the Pennsylvania PBS television series Battling Opioids. Part Eight took a retrospective look at season 3. Personal stories from veterans, the underserved, and people in recovery who were affected by the pandemic were presented.

In addition, a panel discussion with regional experts provided information and resources where to get help.

Pennsylvania PBS stations WHYY (Philadelphia), WITF (Harrisburg), WLVT/PBS39 (Greater Lehigh Valley), WPSU (State College), WQED(Pittsburgh), WQLN (Northwestern Pennsylvania), and WVIA (Northeastern Pennsylvania) are collaborating to produce educational programming that focuses on the opioid crisis and its impact.

Each week, our hosts will inspire audiences to engage in conversations that highlight critical stories in our region. WVIA's Larry Vojtko and Erika Funke, as well as Kris Jones (Entrepreneur/Author) and Tonyehn Verkitus (Executive Director of the Lackawanna and Luzerne County Medical Societies) serve as moderators.

Guided by research from <u>The Institute for Public Policy & Economic Development</u> and ideas from a volunteer editorial advisory panel, including veteran journalists throughout the region, Keystone Edition explores important topics in economic development, community affairs, education, workforce development, business, public health, organized labor, climate change, arts and culture, all with a goal of improving the quality of life in our region.

In the year 2017 alone, 1.5 million Pennsylvanians lacked access to affordable food and were at risk of going hungry. In Northeastern PA, multiple organizations are working every day to lower that number and keep their communities well-fed, even in areas known as food deserts.

There is robust evidence that social isolation and loneliness also significantly increases the risk for premature mortality.

A Call to CARE is a one-hour original documentary film produced by WVIA that explores how that legacy is being applied in the 21st century through a unique endeavor by criminal justice professionals. The film explores the Court-Assisted Re-Entry Program, an effort to help paroled individuals with a moderate-to-high risk of recidivism avoid a devastating relapse into criminal behavior. It chronicles the program's comprehensive rehabilitative process and celebrates its healing resonance in the community.

Mind Over Matter: Mental Health in the Age of COVID

More than 17.5% of adults in Pennsylvania have a form of mental illness, and 20.9% of Pennsylvanians seeking mental health treatment find it inaccessible or prohibitively difficult to obtain. In Lackawanna and Luzerne counties, the number of diagnoses for mental health issues has risen significantly since 2008. Untreated mental disorders can cause major problems in a person's daily life, leading to physical health issues and lessened general capabilities when it comes to routine tasks or capacity to retain employment. Mental Illness can also be a significant contributor to substance abuse and criminal behavior.

In order to combat the stigma and increase awareness, prevention, treatment and management of a range of mental Illnesses. In 2021 WVIA presented a new mental health initiative called Mind Over Matter. Like WVIA's successful Battling Opioids series, this public health initiative aims to improve the mental and physical health of our community through a multi-platform approach that will include TV, radio and digital content.

Mind Over Matter, assembled a panel of regional experts to discuss, stigma, senior isolation, telemedicine, and how families are managing through the latest COVID surge. In addition, presented were personal stories from those who are coping with mental health challenges and provide information on where to get help.

Steve Coll, Pulitzer Prize winning author; Dean, Columbia University School of Journalism; and staff writer, The New Yorker, and Joseph Bennett former U.S. Army soldier, pilot, and BU graduate.

The Swingin' Jazz Nutcracker Suite, performed by the 17-piece Scranton Jazz Festival Big Band under the direction of Marko Marcinko. Music by Peter Tchaikovsky and arrangements by Shorty Rogers. Never done before in NEPA, this unique special concert will highlight 17 incredible musicians and narrator/ vocalist. The musicians are regular members of the Scranton Jazz Festival Big Band with the addition of some special guests. Playing the historically familiar melodies from the Nutcracker Ballet, this jazz big band takes a more modern approach to the familiar. This Nutcracker production tells the classic story through the power of the music and spoken word.



RADIO PROGRAMMING INITIATIVES

Keystone Edition. The weekly radio public affairs magazine presented more than 150 long-form interviews/features. *Keystone Edition* is heard Sundays at 7:30am and 4:30pm. The combined monthly cume of both broadcasts is over 8500. Indeed, the Sunday afternoon broadcast of *Keystone Edition* attracts a third more listeners than the Sunday edition of *All Things Considered*.

Local newscasts. WVIA's monthly cume is over 60,000. Of that our newscasts during the broadcast of *All Things Considered* reaches an audience of over 30,000.

ArtScene: Erika Funke highlights regional arts and culture in 250 interviews, this year including Teri Gross, TV and film art director Stephen Hendrickson, Russian pianist and Tchaikovsky competition winner Daniil Trifonov, and special guests for Black History Month, Women's History Month, Hispanic Heritage Month, and North American Heritage Month. Matthew Rupcich, Artistic Director of the Arcadia Chorale wrote to Erika Funke: "Thank-you so much for giving me the opportunity to represent the Arcadia Chorale in such a meaningful way with your broadcast of *ArtScene* today. We appreciate your support."

ArtScene Promos: WVIA Radio also produces a series of highly-produced PSAs for regional arts and cultural events. Upon hearing the promo for a performance by Mavis Staples, Lisa Leighton of the Weis Center, Lewisburg wrote: "This is wonderful -- you captured her so beautifully! Daily Classical: WVIA has been a respected source of classical music on the radio for over 4 decades. From treasured recordings of past artists to the newest classical releases Lisa, Erika, and Larry not only provide the excitement and beauty of the music, but also add insightful and informative commentary staying true to WVIA's claim as the region's "arts and information station".



We celebrate the diverse communities in our region with special programming for Black History Month, Women's History Month, Jazz Appreciation Month, Hispanic Heritage Month, Memorial and Veterans Days and the 4th of July. T

Weekly Classical

Music from St. Stephen's. For more than three decades WVIA has been producing a half-hour program of *Music from St. Stephen's*, an Episcopal church in Wilkes-Barre. The organ in the church is of the highest quality and the organist is an internationally-recognized musician, Mark Laubach. In the time of COVID, Mark says, "We hear from many folks how particularly grateful they are for the radio show at a time when they can't attend live services or concerts."

Music to My Ears. Each week Gary Boerckel, Professor emeritus of Lycoming College, shares his insights and knowledge of classical music. Gary's program is built around a theme. The themes range from specific classical artists, to depictions in music of human activity. For instance, a recent program featured pieces about carnivals and festivals. Gary also previews upcoming concerts in the Williamsport and Susquehanna Valley.

Notes on Film. Each Sunday at Noon Paul shares his passion for film music in an hourlong program of music from movies old and new. Paul also provides commentary, fun facts and other tidbits of information about not only the composers, but the actors, directors and other creative artists of cinema.

Opera Encore. WVIA is one of the few stations in the nation to bring to listeners operative performances each week. However, most Saturdays these live performances and recordings run short of the 4-hour time block. Larry happily takes on the task of providing programming between the end of the opera to the beginning of All Things Considered. At times this programming can be as much as two-hours. During this programming Larry previews the next week's opera pulling on WVIA's extensive library of opera recordings. Listeners are also introduced to lesser-known instrumental works by opera composers.

Classical Specials

This year Larry Vojtko produced three classical music specials. For Black HIstory Month Larry's production was *Paul Freeman: Perchance to Dream*, an appreciation of the black American conductor who enjoyed an international concert and recording career. To mark the arrival of summer, Larry's program is called *Welcome, Summer.* The music chosen was inspired by this season of blooming roses, ripe fruit, warm sunshine, and cool water. To commemorate the 20th anniversary of the catastrophic events of 9/11, WVIA Radio will preempt the opera to present a WVIA music special, *9/11, In Memoriam.* Larry put together a program consisting of music of remembrance including pieces written in reaction to the events of 9/11. The expressive and healing powers of music come to the fore in this special drawing from recordings in the WVIA Radio classical library. Pieces include *On the Transmigration of Souls* by John Adams and Robert Moran's *Trinity Requiem* which was commissioned to observe the 10th anniversary of 9/1.

In December, after a one-year hiatus due to the COVID pandemic, the Arcadia Chorale again presented the *Messiah Sing-Along*. WVIA continued its decades-long tradition of recording and broadcasting this local performance of Handel's masterpiece.



Daily/Weekly Jazz. Weeknights at 7, host George Graham presents a variety of types of jazz on *All That Jazz*,and WVIA aired 10 hours of the COTA Festival in Delaware Water Gap, PA, along with the WVIA holiday recording of *Swingin' Jazz Nutcracker Suite*. WVIA's Chiaroscuro Jazz label released a previously unissued recording by Paul Bacon, and CD issues of out-of-print vinyl titles by Gil Goldstein, and the duo of Kenny Davern & Flip Phillips.

On *Jazz Standards* (Saturday, 9pm), Sascha Feinstein, professor and Lycoming College and nationally-recognized jazz expert focuses on one artist each week, often featuring rare recordings of jazz greats.

Special Celebrations

April is *National Jazz Appreciation Month.* As northeastern and central Pennsylvania's premiere source for jazz, WVIA Radio celebrated in grand style. Among the special offerings were Homegrown Music sessions with regional jazz luminaries broadcast each Wednesday during the month. These artists were: 3D Jazz Trio (formerly 3Divas); Bill Mays & the Inventions Trio, a session which led to the Chiaroscuro release Life's a Movie; The Jay Leonhart Trio; and The Ingrid Jensen/Roberta Piket Quartet. WVIA's jazz guru, George Graham, also mined the treasure of substantial archival recordings of events such as COTA and the Scranton Jazz Festival as well as the vast library of recordings contained in the library of WVIA's recording label, Chiaroscuro Jazz. Additionally each week WVIA's Erika Funke presented a jazz-oriented feature on ArtScene. Even WVIA's Classical music programming celebrated the uniquely American art of jazz by including jazz-inspired pieces. Composers, such as Ravel, Shostokovich, and, of course, George Gershwin, wrote pieces influenced by jazz.

Each year, Americans observe *National Hispanic Heritage Month* from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the histories, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America. WVIA Radio joined this month-long celebration in recognition of the contributions of the growing hispanic community that adds to the vitality of the cultural richness in northeastern and central Pennsylvania. Music hosts Lisa Mazzarella, Erika Funke, Larry Vojtko, and George Graham spiced their programming with music created and performed by artists of Hispanic and Latino heritage.

Ken Burns' documentary *Hemingway* provided the occasion for 8 special events, including film screenings and discussions with the Wyoming County Reads organization and Hemingway birthday parties at libraries and other venues, complete with book giveaways. The film *Oliver Sacks: His Own Life* prompted a partnership with Geisinger and The Wright Center to feature area physicians commenting on the renowned neurologist's legacy. WVIA produced five short videos showcasing area residents from diverse backgrounds expressing their views for the PBS American Portrait project, celebrating these special quests at two screenings.

Along with previews for Ken Burns' next documentary, *Muhammad Ali*, WVIA hosted four Community Conversations based on Ali's "Red Bike Moment," a turning point when he discovered his passion and purpose in life. Special thanks to the kids and coaches of Rocky Boxing of Berwick for their participation. And when the Dietrich Theater presented the emotional *Joe Bell* in its fall film festival, WVIA distributed literature at 6 screenings



connecting the audience to our new behavioral health programming initiative, **Mind Over Matter**. Near the end of the year, we began a series of "listening events" throughout the region to gather community suggestions for the new WVIA journalism initiative
