As we send this newsletter out, President Trump just asked Congress to take back \$1.1 billion it previously set aside for all public broadcasting for the next two years. And a sneak peek at the July 17th Lander Public Library Carnegie Room presentation at 6:30 p.m., where our news reporters will feature their podcast season "The Gray In Between." More to come as the schedule fills up.

What's a summer without the smooth sounds of jazz? Many regard it as America's true art form, and it has become an essential part of our national culture. While not widely known, WPM features an incredible *Jazz Channel* that deserves your attention. Its relative obscurity may stem from the fact that it's only broadcast in Laramie at 90.1 FM, a limitation due to funding constraints. However, you can easily tune in online, enjoying the vibrant world of jazz from anywhere! In addition to the captivating music, *Jazz Wyoming* keeps you

informed with NPR News Headlines at the top of every hour—brief but essential. Don't miss out; stream it at JazzWyoming.org! Supporting channels like *Jazz Wyoming* and *Classical Wyoming* is vital for nurturing cultural programming, which lies at the heart of public broadcasting's mission.

Speaking of culture -- Wyoming Public Media presents *Western Tales & Poetry*, a two- minute weekly series featuring readings by authors and poets from Wyoming and the West. Authors will include Craig Johnson, Katherine Standefer, CJ Box, Jamie Lisa Forbes and Bob Budd along with poets including Rod Miller, Bryce Angell and many more. *Western tales and Poetry*, hosted by Grady Kirkpatrick, can be heard Mondays at 6:42 am, Wednesdays at 7:42 am, Fridays at 10:05 am and Saturdays at 12:05 pm beginning the week of June 9th.

Congress is responsible for funding the *Corporation for Public Broadcasting* (CPB), which in turn supports WPM. 
