We mourn the passing of Anne Garrels, longtime foreign correspondent for NPR, and ABC before that. Globally recognized for her war reporting that took her anywhere there was a war, her experiences covering the Iraq war resulted in the book, Naked in Baghdad. Anne Garrels was 71 years old, and died of lung cancer.

As Nancy Barnes, NPR's Senior Vice President of news since 2018, departs, NPR is creating a new Chief Content Officer position to cover today's fast-changing media landscape. The new position serves as liaison between NPR and local member station

producers and content managers across platforms. In other NPR developments, a new Climate Desk was launched to address issues dealing with heat, droughts, floods and other weather events that touch on many areas of coverage from business to politics, to health. This new desk is supported by the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative, and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Check out a new program we're trying out. It's called *The Middle with Jeremy Hobson* and originates from the heart of the country. Jeremy says, "At this critical moment in history, together we'll help elevate the dialogue —and reignite the conversation to include a huge geographic swath of the population that's not heard often enough on the national stage." At this point over 450 stations will be airing the program—a very large number for a first offering. You may recall Jeremy from his work on Here & Now. The Middle with Jeremy Hobson is scheduled to air October 19th at 7 p.m.

In the spirit of debates, check out the Gubernatorial and U.S. House debates on Thursday, October 13th at 7 and 8 p.m. respectfully and presented by Wyoming PBS. WPM's Kamila Kudelska will be one of the panelists.

Projected dates are late October, with more details to come. Fall fund drive is here, and it's a bittersweet time for us. It marks the last drive with Bob Beck as host in our

studios. Bob was not only a consummate journalist, he was also one of the strongest public radio voices who could persuade donors to support Wyoming Public Media and its journalistic mission. We're lucky to have a number of excellent fund drive hosts, still, we will miss the leading role Bob played in this critical event. So as you listen, send a nod to Bob. You can also share your wishes and stories about Bob here. WPM will collect these thoughts and expressions and send them to Bob later in the fall as mementos of his time in Wyoming. Yellowstone has been in the news, both as a television series and as a National Park. On October 14th,

WPM's Open Spaces will look at Yellowstone National Park's past, present and future. In honor of the 150th

anniversary of the first national park, WPM reporters are taking deep dives into one of the main economic drivers for the state. 

of the news magazine Open Spaces, which has won 11 national Public Media Journalist Association awards. September 30, 2022.





