KRWG-TV is the PBS station located in Las Cruces, New Mexico. We are licensed by New Mexico State University and our offices are located on NMSU's Las Cruces campus. KRWG-TV is proud to be the only television station in southern New Mexico. We also provide unique services in the El Paso, Texas/Las Cruces, New Mexico service area.

Through meetings with citizens and community leaders, partnerships with area newspapers and other organizations, and extensive production of news and public affairs programming, the staff of KRWG-TV has determined the following issues are of primary importance to our coverage area:

Health/Welfare/Safety – While the over-all crime rate is no higher than the national average, poverty and a higher than average teenage population contribute to a gang and crime problem. Poverty also results in health and welfare issues including an above average social services caseload and a high number of welfare cases handled by the local hospital.

Culture – The mix of Hispanic/Native American/ and Anglo cultures provide many positive attributes to life in southern New Mexico. Cultural and historical understanding is of great importance.

Business - With an above-average unemployment rate and a below-average income level, the status of the business/agricultural community in southern New Mexico is crucial. Concern over the constant issue of defense spending at the federal level is ongoing in this area due to the presence of several military and NAS installations. Dona Ana County is also actively seeking new businesses and a strong infrastructure exists near the Santa Teresa Border Crossing to boost border trade.

Politics/Public Affairs – Southern New Mexico and the United States have a wide variety of contentious political issues that are of constant interest to the citizens of the involved communities.

Education – With a constantly growing population of children, many of whom use Spanish as their primary language, the school systems in the KRWG-TV viewing area are constantly trying to provide facilities and teachers to meet this growing school age population with limited funds. New Mexico is one of the poorest per-capita states in the nation, which results in a chronic shortage of funds for local education.

Water/Environment – KRWG-TV is located in a desert with two major sources of water: the Rio Grande River and an aquifer that supplies drinking water to Las Cruces and surrounding areas in the Mesilla Valley. Water is the lifeblood of the region and conflicts are escalating over the requirements of a growing urban population and agriculture.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we revisit some of the biggest stories and headlines of 2025.

This year, we broke down the mayoral elections in Santa Fe and Albuquerque. In a conversation that first aired in December, host Nash Jones sat down with two former city councilors to explore Tim Keller's successful run for an unprecedented third consecutive term as Albuquerque mayor. Then, in a discussion that first ran in November, a journalist and a political science professor considered why voters chose to promote City Councilor Michael Garcia to be next mayor of the state's capital city.

In 2014, Albuquerque city leaders and the US Department of Justice signed a settlement agreement after a federal investigation found an unconstitutional pattern of excessive force by

the Albuquerque Police Department. Eleven years later, a federal judge dismissed the agreement after determining city police had complied. In a special two-episode series that first aired in May, we explored what the end of federal oversight at APD means for the city. Parents Steve and Renetta Torres told Executive Producer Jeff Proctor about their push for reform at APD after two plainclothes detectives shot and killed their son 14 years ago. Then, Nash Jones sat down with Police Chief Harold Medina to discuss the changes he's made to the department and the deeper issue of what federal investigators called its "culture of aggression."

The Cibola County Correctional Center is one of three prisons in New Mexico that hold immigrants for ICE — US Immigration and Customs Enforcement. In this piece that first ran in August, reporter Cailley Chella spoke to several men locked up in Cibola County, as well as a group of local volunteers working to make sure they feel seen.

This summer, Congress approved President Trump's request to strip away the next two years of funds previously allocated to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. As a result, our local public television station and about 1,500 others — along with the national PBS and NPR networks — will no longer receive federal funding starting in October. In this conversation that first aired in July, we invited two local opinion columnists to continue a debate that has been heard in Washington, DC for years: Should taxpayer dollars fund public broadcasting? Since our funding is caught up in this debate, we put up several firewalls to avoid a conflict of interest. Trip Jennings, executive director of New Mexico in Depth, hosted this two-part conversation with Santa Fe New Mexican opinion page editor Inez Russell Gomez and Albuquerque Journal editorial contributor Jeff Tucker.

In a segment that first ran in July, Cailley took us to the Trinity Site in Southern New Mexico, where a new sign now stands to acknowledge the human toll of the nuclear bomb that first exploded there 80 years ago.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we check in on newly enacted state and federal laws and spending. Nine new state laws rang in the new year, with six centered on health care. New work requirements have been placed on recipients of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, the federal food assistance program that more than one in five New Mexicans rely on. Dec. 31 also saw the expiration of Affordable Care Act tax credits. We detail how decisions made last year by state lawmakers will make up for those lost subsidies through the end of this fiscal year.

Albuquerque Mayor Tim Keller began an unprecedented, third consecutive term this month. We take you to the inauguration ceremony where Keller spoke about his plans.

Democratic state House Speaker Javier Martínez stopped by the studio to chat with Host Nash Jones about the next legislative session. In this first of a two-part conversation, Jones asked how state lawmakers plan on balancing the budget as state government wallets across the country continue to tighten.

This year marks the fifth anniversary of the Jan. 6 insurrection, where a violent mob of Trump supporters stormed the U.S. Capitol, and the first with President Trump back in the White House. Reporter Cailley Chella spoke with protestors in downtown Albuquerque to hear how they look back on that grim day.

Bosque Brewing closed the last of its locations in December, after a judge threw out the company's request for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection. Albuquerque Journal reporter Natalie Robbins and blogger Chris Jackson recently sat down with Senior Producer Lou DiVizio to talk about the closings and consider the overall health of the state's brewhouse scene.

Jones asks the panel how lawmakers plan on balancing the state's \$11 billion budget during the short 30-day session. Also, with this being the last regular session for the termed-out Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, the panel considers how the outgoing governor will push to pass policies before her time in Santa Fe ends.

Last week, Democratic House Speaker Javier Martínez spoke with Nash Jones about what his caucus expects to get done in the upcoming session. This week, Martínez gives us an update on how a few bills lawmakers passed last year and the year before are showing up today.

For years as a reporter for Capital and Main, Jerry Redfern has documented the short lives of oil and gas reform bills introduced at the Roundhouse. This year, Jerry will continue his coverage with the news site, while also joining In Focus each week to keep viewers updated on his reporting in Santa Fe. This week, Jerry tells Executive Producer Jeff Proctor what he expects to see at this year's session.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we head to Santa Fe for the start of this year's 30-day legislative session.

In her final State of the State address, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham acknowledged the work done by Sen. Peter Wirth. The Senate Majority Leader is working to quickly pass several measures during the first week of the session, including several medical compact bills and a change to the state's civil commitment law. Host Nash Jones spoke with Wirth in his Roundhouse office about the so-called "rocket docket." Also, Jones asks where Wirth stands on a few high-profile proposals, including Senate Democrats' shift to supporting a ban on ICE contracts for immigrant prisons in our state.

Republican Sen. Nicole Tobiassen sat on a bipartisan working group that prepared medical compact legislation for the session and is a co-sponsor of a Senate proposal to join the compacts. Tobiassen spoke with Nash about that push, New Mexico's doctor shortage and her first-hand experience failing to find medical treatment for her husband.

Capital and Main reporter Jerry Redfern speaks with Missi Currier, president and CEO of the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association. Currier tells Jerry which bills she's keeping an eye on this year. This week on New Mexico in Focus, we return to Santa Fe for the second week of a quick-moving 30-day legislative session.

The Immigrant Safety Act, introduced by Democratic state Reps. Eleanor Chávez and Angelica Rubio, would ban public entities from contracting with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency to lock up immigrants. Host Nash Jones spoke with both representatives about the bill, as the legislation seems poised to pass both chambers of the Roundhouse. Later, Nash speaks with Cibola County Manager Kate Fletcher, who offered a nuanced perspective on her government's relationship with ICE and the role prisons play where she lives.

Earlier this week, hundreds of people from across the state gathered in Santa Fe for the 2026 Immigrant and Worker Day of Action. A group from Farmington traveled hours to make sure lawmakers heard their community's voice. Reporter Cailley Chella was there as they rallied for safety, privacy and a safe place in New Mexico's future.

This month, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reversed course on decades of institutional knowledge and changed its vaccine recommendations for children. The shift has puzzled medical experts, and it leaves the CDC at odds with a longtime partner: the American Academy of Pediatrics. Senior Producer Lou DiVizio sat down with the state's top doctor, Miranda Durham, to try and unravel the confusion and break down what this all means for families in New Mexico.

Democratic state Sen, Mimi Stewart has been trying for years to codify climate goals set by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham back in 2017. Stewart tells correspondent Gwyneth Doland why this year's bill, the Clear Horizons Act, might finally make its way to the governor's desk.

Among the changes in this year's Clear Horizons bill is a requirement for the Environment Department to consult with potentially effected tribal governments before enacting new policies. Ahtza Dawn Chavez, executive director of NM Native Vote, spoke with Gwyneth about that addition, how it protects tribal sovereignty while still moving the state forward toward reducing emissions.

Capital and Main reporter Jerry Redfern returns to the studio to talk with Executive Producer Jeff Proctor about a seismology equipment funding bill that has more to do with the oil and gas industry than meets the eye.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we waded into the debate over changing the state's medical malpractice laws. House Bill 99 would restrict how much money some people could collect in malpractice lawsuits. The highest-profile supporter of this bill is Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham. In an interview with politics correspondent Gwyneth Doland, the governor makes her case for the bill and tells us what she meant when she told the Albuquerque Journal that she's not leaving office without the change.

Karen Bateman's daughter Kelsey died in 2018 as a result of medical malpractice, leaving two young children behind. Hers is one of many voices opposing malpractice reform. Host Nash Jones spoke with Bateman about her concerns: that the proposed changes would lead to less deterrence and accountability for negligent doctors and hospitals.

Last week, in partnership with New Mexico in Focus, Source New Mexico's Patrick Lohmann published a story revealing that Jay Mitchell, the director of the Hermits Peak-Calf Canyon FEMA claims office, received more than \$250,000 in federal relief for claimed smoke damage at his Angel Fire home after the 2022 Hermits Peak-Calf Canyon Fire. The payment sparked outrage in the Northern New Mexico community, where many are still waiting for federal help. Lohmann and In Focus Reporter Cailley Chella went to Angel Fire to get answers from Mitchell and for the area's communities who are demanding accountability.

Last month, Bernalillo County District Attorney Sam Bregman made waves when he penned a letter to federal immigration authorities, threatening to prosecute ICE agents who detain people without legal justification in his jurisdiction. Alex Uballez, a former U.S. Attorney for the District of New Mexico, sat down with Executive Producer Jeff Proctor to discuss whether Bregman's threat holds any legal weight.

A new "structured literacy" program has made its way into many classrooms across the state and, according to Senate President Pro Tem Mimi Stewart, is already producing success. Stewart tells Gwyneth why she is pushing a bill that would lean more heavily on the program to teach children to read.

Some teachers in the state are already using a "structured literacy" approach, thanks in large part to Project ECHO — a tele-mentoring program based at the University of New Mexico. Dr. Soraya Gollop leads its education division. She recently chatted with Senior Producer Lou DiVizio about how the teaching program works.

Environmental activists Clara Sims and Desirée Bernard walked from Carlsbad to Santa Fe to support a bill that would cement the governor's climate and pollution goals into law. Capital and Main reporter Jerry Redfern spoke with the pair about their pilgrimage.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we zero in on the state's budget as lawmakers work to finalize the massive spending plan. Senate Finance Chair George Muñoz, a Gallup Democrat, talks to host Nash Jones about several contentious line items, including copays for universal childcare and billions set aside for public and higher education.

Then, politics correspondent Gwyneth Doland checks in with Sen. Steve Lanier, the second-ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee and a candidate for governor, to learn where the state GOP stands on the budget.

Later, Gwyneth speaks with five different lawmakers, each representing a different community of New Mexicans, to find out the one thing they're fighting for in this year's budget. An important note and an apology: We also spoke with Republican Reps. Jennifer Jones and Gail Armstrong for this segment. Unfortunately, those responses will not air due to technical difficulties.

The Clear Horizons Act, meant to set the governor's carbon emission goals into law, died in the Senate this week as seven Democrats joined state Republicans to kill the bill. Capital and Main reporter Jerry Redfern sits down with Camilla Feibelman, director of the Rio Grande Chapter of the Sierra Club, to dig into the bill and consider how its failure will cost the state.

Last year, the Trump administration gutted the Clean Water Act, which protected millions of acres of wetlands, rivers and streams. That has prompted state officials and environmental groups to try and plug the proverbial dam and take charge of ensuring water quality. Correspondent Elizabeth Miller joins Tricia Snyder, Rivers and Waters program director for the New Mexico Wilderness Alliance, on the banks of the Santa Fe River to learn more.

The New Mexico Department of Agriculture offers a grant program to help improve soil conditions around the state. Nash speaks with program co-lead Katie Crayton, as well as Taos-based soil health coordinator Tyler Zander, about the "Healthy Soil Program" and how these grants are healing the state's scorched surface.

This week on New Mexico in Focus, we're marking Sunshine Week — the annual celebration of the fight for government transparency — with the New Mexico Foundation for Open Government. Executive Producer Jeff Proctor sat down with NMFOG board member Greg Williams to evaluate the state of local government transparency, where the light shines brightly in New Mexico, and what remains in the shadows.

In honor of Women's History Month, we searched through the archives for some of the best stories of gender equity and groundbreaking women that we've aired in recent years.

We revisit a conversation from 2023 with Martha Burk — former chair of the National Council of Women's Organization — about a letter she sent more than two decades ago that rocked the insular, men's-only membership of the Augusta National Golf Club.

For nearly a century now, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences has gendered its awards for performers. A few years back, a group of undergraduate constitutional law students at the University of New Mexico questioned that structure — and their report made it all the way

to the Academy's Board of Governors. Last year, Senior Producer Lou Divizio sat down with two of the 10 student authors and their professor to find out what they recommended — and why.

On Oct. 5, 2022, NASA's "SpaceX Crew Five" launched from the Kennedy Space Center with astronaut Nicole Mann not only on board, but commanding the mission. That day, she became the first Native American woman in space. Before she blasted off on her historic mission, Mann caught up with correspondent Antonia Gonzales.

Back in 1993, the Vietnam Women's Memorial became the first monument —to =women installed on the National Mall in Washington, DC. Thirty years later, Faith Perez, host of the NMPBS arts and culture program ¡Colores!, spoke with two local nurses who served in Vietnam about what the memorial — and its acknowledgement of that war's women veterans — has meant to them through the years.
