Public Radio 90 Programming Changes

Due to the loss of federal funding, Public Radio 90 has had to make some programming changes. We have been working with all of our programming partners to seek relief in the overall cost of each program and most have been very willing to assist us in keeping our regular line-up of programs, but we do have a few changes to report.

Harmonia, Afterglow, Jazz Night in America, and World Café (Monday airing only/Saturday evening airing remains in place) are all being replaced with other programming options that do not have a cost associated with carriage.
