On March 26th Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Greene's DOGE subcommittee heard testimony from *NPR* CEO Katherine Maher, *PBS* CEO Paula Kerger, Alaska Public Media CEO Ed Ulman, and Michael Gonzales, Senior Fellow, Heritage Foundation. The Federal Communications Commission sent letters to 13 public radio stations asking them to compile materials detailing past sponsorships by March 31. The request builds on FCC Chair Brendan Carr's investigation into whether public TV and radio stations are airing advertisements in violation of federal guidelines.

Recently, President Trump said that he'd be happy to see public broadcasters lose their federal funding. "It's been very biased," said Trump. "We don't need it, and it's a waste of money." But is that what Americans think? Pew Research [released a survey last week](#) that finds 43% think Congress should fund *NPR* and *PBS*. That compares to 24% who prefer to end funding. A third of Americans polled by Pew say they are not sure. The survey was conducted March 10-16. It also shows that 69% of Democrats want to fund public media, while 19% of Republicans agree to continued funding.

Protesting activity at major campuses has resulted in accusations of antisemitism and questions on how the media covers it. Responding to a listener comment and query, the *NPR Public Editor* provided insight into the network's coverage. ([*NPR Public Editor by Poynter's Kelly McBride*](#))

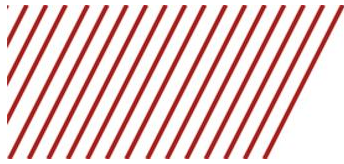

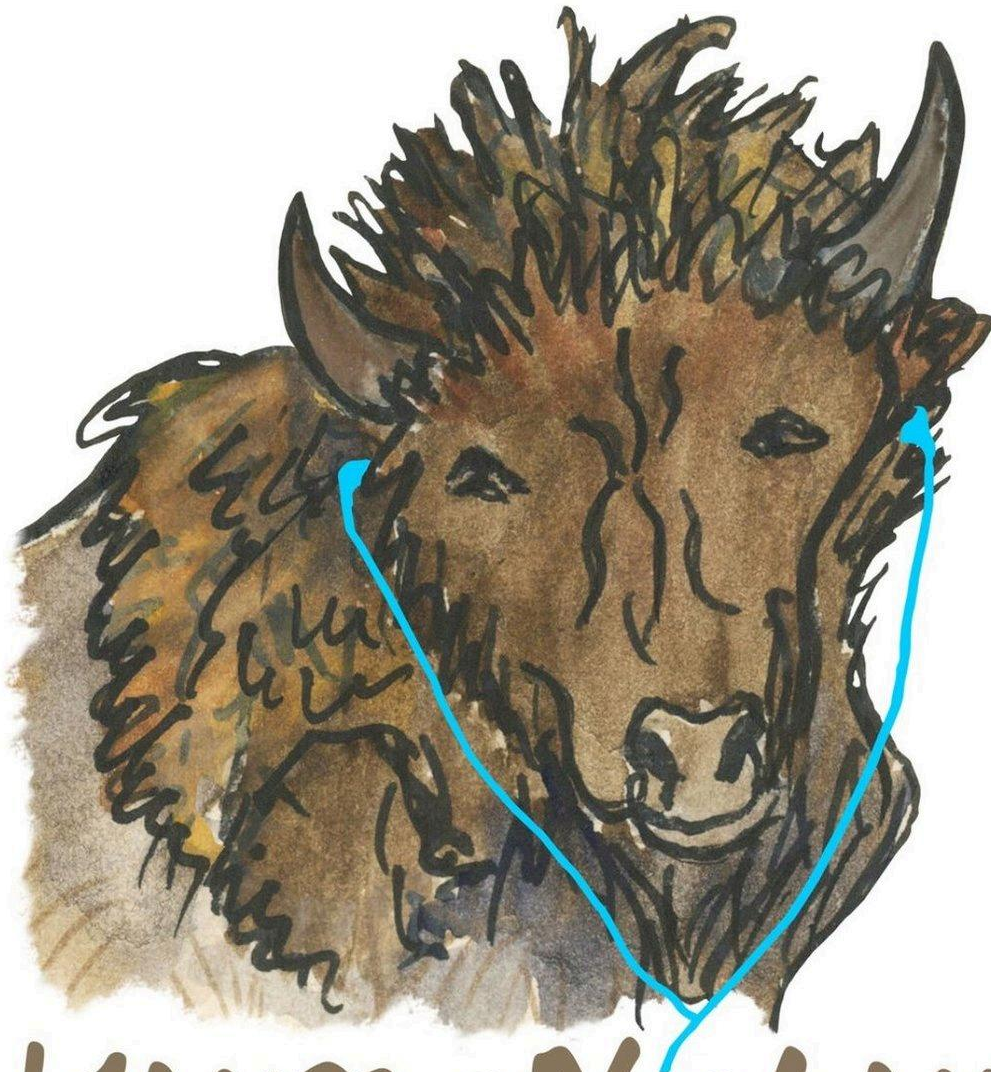

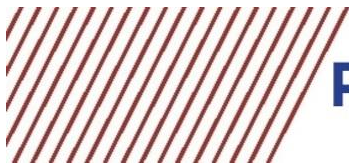
