NPR Cities Project

NPR's Cities Project is an ongoing series on urban life in the 21st century.

We're currently in the third season of this project, which is broken into three parts:

- · Where We Live
- How We Live
- · How We Get Around

Part one, Where We Live, heard last fall, included stories about living in flood zones in New Jersey, the current effects of historically segregated neighborhoods in Beirut, and the pros and cons of removing historical communist-era architecture in Berlin.

Part two, *How We Live*, started in January, and is telling stories about neighborhood design.

January 22nd, Morning Edition covered the idea of designing cities like sponges, in order to conserve water and minimize the negative effects of drought. The story investigated Elmer Avenue in Los Angeles, where the city invested in sponge-like infrastructure including permeable driveways and droughttolerant landscaping. These improvements

have allowed the rain to be soaked up, so that it can be treated as a precious resource, rather than being sent out to sea via storm

Another story, heard February 5th on Morning Edition, tackled the idea of mixed-income housing by reporting on the potential redevelopment of a Chicago Public Housing complex. They looked in-depth at Lathrop Homes, but also considered the successes and shortcomings

of other mixed-income housing developments.

Additional stories in this part of the series will cover Co-Housing, Tiny Living, and life on the "smart grid."

Later this year, NPR will unveil part three in the series - How We Get Around. Nothing is more integral to a city than the mobility of its people, and the series will explore how transportation and access to it affects life in the city. New technologies will also be examined.



Meet the Voices: Ken Dudzik, Station Manager

Ken Dudzik's career in the Broadcasting industry began in Pittsburg, Kansas as an Anchor/Reporter at KOAM-TV, a station that served a four state area of Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Missouri.

After only a year, he had the opportunity to pursue his dream at the time of becoming a sportscaster and landed a position as Weekend Sports Anchor/Reporter at KSNT-TV in Topeka, Kansas. A few years later he became the Sports Director and spent a total of 11 years at the station. During his sports days, Ken had the privilege of covering some great names in their games: Joe Montana, Marcus Allen, George Brett, Dale Earnhardt, Coaches Roy Williams and Bill Snyder just to name a few.

In 1997, he decided it was time to hang up the cleats so to speak as he had an opportunity to move into a newsroom management position as Managing Editor. After one year running the day to day newsroom operations, he was promoted to News Director at KSNT-TV where he spent four years.

In 2001, the same position became available

at KMTV here in Omaha. Owned by the same company as KSNT at the time, taking the position at KMTV was a nice transition for him moving into a larger media market.

Ken became Station Manager at KIOS-FM in August of 2009. While the transition from commercial TV to public radio was an interesting challenge early on, broadcasting is still broadcasting and KIOS is a great place to be. Thanks to a great staff, wonderful volunteers and tremendous community support, Omaha Public Radio continues to grow each year.
